More About the ACCELL Model

To support English learners' content learning, teachers learn to build students' background knowledge and foundational skills, support their vocabulary acquisition, and develop their comprehension through close reading. To support narrative and informational writing, teachers learn to model and use graphic organizers aligned to each genre. To develop listening and speaking skills, teachers learn to support academic conversations. To develop language skills, teachers learn to use functional analysis and language mini-lessons.

More About the ACCELL Tools

- Word analyzer: This tool displays words in text that are among the 4,000 most frequent words in English texts for grades K-12.
- Lesson preparation template and overview: These documents provide a template for teachers and curriculum developers to help them develop lessons that are aligned with college- and career-ready standards and consistent with the ACCELL model.
- Guide to making complex text comprehensible for English learners: This tool describes text complexity at the lexical, sentence, and discourse levels, with concrete information and examples for making complex text comprehensible for English learners.
- Standards-aligned question stems: This tool provides text-dependent question stems and example questions aligned with challenging state reading standards for grades 2–12. Its purpose is to help teachers create text-dependent questions that support students in meeting grade-level content standards in English language arts.
- Functional grammar analysis guide: This tool provides instruction and examples for functional grammar analysis of phrases and sentences—a method to help English learners understand complex syntax.
- Language mini-lessons: This tool provides teachers with developmentally appropriate standards-aligned grammar and punctuation mini-lessons.
- *Model curriculum:* Model lessons are available for three grade spans.
