How much does an evidence-based cyberbullying program cost?

Evidence-based cyberbullying programs



Polanin and colleagues (2021) examined the impacts of **school-based programming on cyberbullying** perpetration and victimization outcomes.



After an extensive search and screening process, the authors identified **50 studies published** from 2002 to 2019 that met the predetermined review criteria.



The average program **significantly reduced both cyberbullying perpetration** (g = -.18) and victimization (g = -.13).



From this set of 50 studies, we identified **three evidence-based programs** from high-quality evaluations.

- (1) Media Heroes (MH; Wölfer et al., 2014)
- (2) KiVa Antibullying Program (Williford et al., 2013)
- (3) Cyberprogram 2.0 (CP; Garaigordobil & Martínez-Valderrey, 2015)

Cost estimates for evidence-based cyberbullying programs



Using Levin and colleagues' (2018) ingredients method, we conducted a "back of the envelope" **assessment of the three programs'** resource use.



We reviewed all relevant public sources of information on the three programs, including papers, briefs, program websites, and other available sources, to **create a list** of "ingredients" needed to implement the **programs** as designed in a class of 25 students.



Education stakeholders should use the following information as a guide when considering what programs to purchase or implement.



Some care should be taken in **interpreting our estimates** because program costs will vary with school type, location, program pricing, implementation, and other unique school characteristics.

Cost estimates do not include facility costs, such as a charge for classroom space; educators that anticipate incurred facility costs should add these costs to the total.
