
## Who's Graduating?



**82 percent** of public high school students graduated during the **2013-14 school year.**\*




This is the **highest rate since these data were first collected** during the 2010-11 school year. Then, the graduation rate was 79%.

Asian/Pacific Islander and White students generally had higher graduation rates than the national average.




Hispanic, Black, and American Indian/Alaska Native students generally saw lower graduation rates than the U.S. average.
